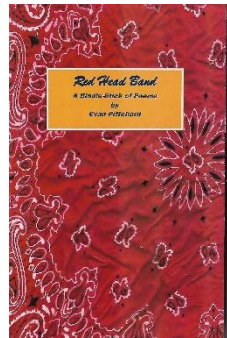

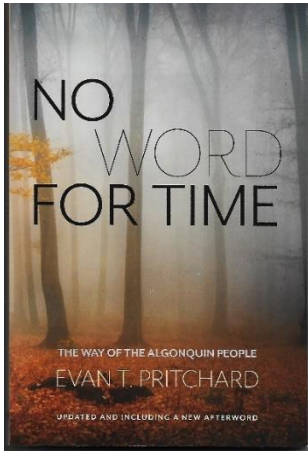

Thursday, September 27th, 2018: TRIBAL HARMONY; Evan will open and MC for the combined ensembles of Mamalama and Andes Manta at The Falcon, 1348 route 9W, Marlboro, NY. 7 PM. Mamalama is an ever-evolving, uncommon orchestration that includes European/ Paraguayan harps, piano, ethereal voices, traditional Native American/Andean flutes, hammered dulcimer, music boxes, harmonium, octave mandolin, charango and frame drums. Andes Manta is a four-brother ensemble from Ecuador who have been performing the traditional music of the Andes for over 30 years throughout the United States. They perform with over 35 traditional instruments including a wide variety of traditional Andean flutes (including some that are 6 feet long), charango, ocarinas, percussion,

bandolin, and more. They have collaborated with artists like Paul Winter, as well as performed in spaces like Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, The National Cathedral.

In this talk Pritchard will strive for a better understanding of the group of Native Americans we call “The Schoharie Tribe,” with a focus on the Middleburgh/Gilboa region. Starting with the arrival of early -pre Haudenosuane in 500, he will comment on Dr Edward V Curtain's theories about peaceful landsharing by diverse peoples amid plenty. Then he will discuss who “chief Koernig Andante” and his wife might have been (and their mysterious association with young Conrad Weiser) and then who the “Schoharie” tribe might have been, up to the time of the Revolutionary War. He will also discuss his understanding of the word Schoharie and how it seems to reflect an intimate understanding of the land around Middleburgh. Pritchard will reference the work of Dr Curtain, John M. Brown, Nelson Greene, JH French, Jephtha Simms, and Ted Brasser, but also incorporate opinions from local and native historians, who may not necessarily be in agreement.

Free Africans became translators, negotiators for Native Americans, unified to fight a common enemy, 5 percent of all Black American have at least 12.5 percent Native American ancestry (Louis Gates). Native Americans assisted in the Underground Railroad. Some Natives owned slaves and the first Black Native American group was in Hispaniola and escaped to Santo Domingo in 1502.

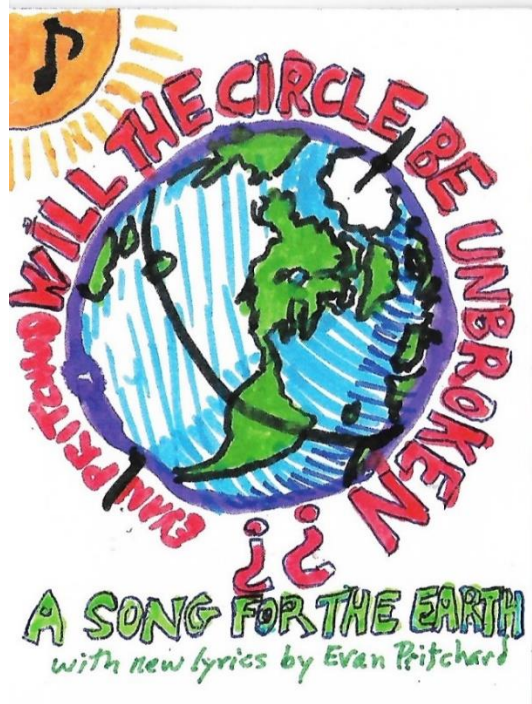
